

ENGLISH AT TEXAS COLLEGE

Texas College's Department of English provides specialized preparation that addresses the social, intellectual, and creative heritage as indispensable to the development of the total person and the competent worker. There is special emphasis placed on English within the Humanities and other media forms. A rich variety of courses focus on the latest literary practices, including studies in drama, poetry, literature, and cinema. On a deeper level, the department also offers courses in comparative literature, research seminars, academic conference participation, professional writing, literary theory, and criticism.

Students aspiring to become candidates for a major in the English must complete a maximum of 44 semester hours of general education courses and 36 hours of institutional requirements in English.

The purpose of the Bachelor of Arts in English program is to provide students with comprehensive and rigorous education in the field of English, catering to both majors and minors with a wide range of understanding within the discipline. The program is committed to upholding high standards that meet regional and federal criteria, ensuring its sustainability and excellence; it emphasizes the development, monitoring, and implementation of outcomes that align with the principles of accreditation bodies, demonstrating its dedication to delivering a quality educational experience that prepares

students for success in the field of English.

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The program equips students with essential background knowledge for graduate studies in English, prepares them for teacher certification, and fosters skills for employment and success within the English industry. Additionally, it offers an introductory experience to non-majors through the general core requirements. This dual approach ensures a comprehensive education that benefits both future professionals and those seeking to broaden their understanding of English.



The Department of English prepares students for the Bachelor of Arts in English degree. The Department assist student's development with skills leading to English majors being successful with entry into graduate school and other highly valued professions such as education, business, law, public relations, and ministry. For students seeking careers in teaching, the Department offers English courses that support teacher certification programs, including English Language Arts and Reading, 4-8, and English Language Arts and Reading, 7-12. Students interested in teaching should contact the Division of Education. Exit criteria for the Bachelor of Arts in English degree include the minimum grade requirement of "C" in all courses counting toward the major. Students must also complete the English exit exam; this departmental exam is used for diagnostic purposes only.

- 1. The student will enhance their comprehension of English through clearer explanations and definitions of key English concepts
- 2. The student will synthesize and articulate their understanding of English's complexities.
- 3. The student will explain, identify, and define key concepts and principles in English, including various literary genres.
